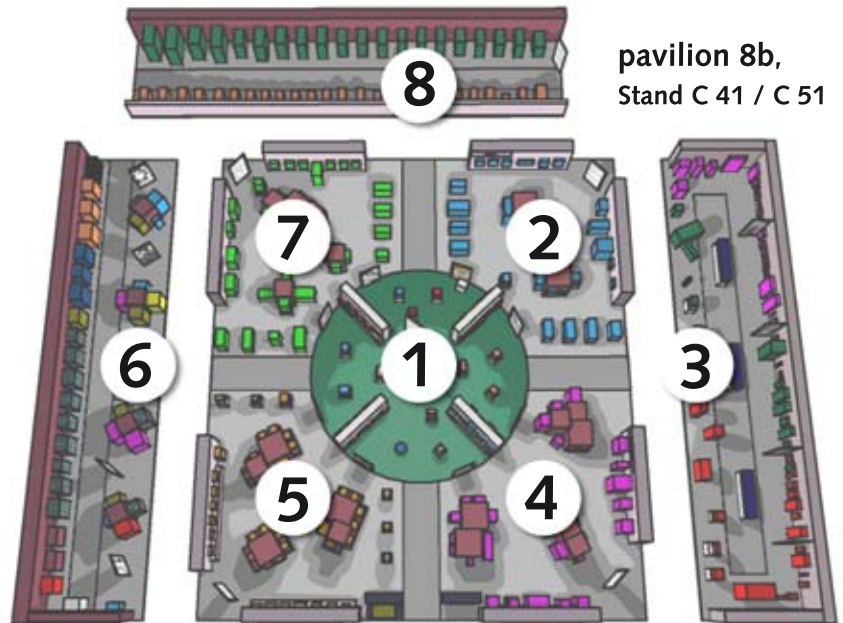

It started more or less by chance in 1985: Michael Gauselmann came up with the idea of collecting historic coin-operated machines and of documenting their history. The idea turned into passion. Nostalgic treasures from many countries were gathered. Thus, the roots of the coin-operated machine industry have become tangible and well-documented.

Finally, in 1995, the Gauselmann Museum was opened at the company headquarters in Espelkamp. Today, with Armin Gauselmann at the helm, the collection has grown further and is now rightly called “Deutsches Automatenmuseum” [German Coin-operated Machines Museum]. More than 1,800 national and international exhibits make the Gauselmann Collection the biggest and most significant of its kind.

Several 100,000 visitors have fallen under the spell of the exhibits of the Gauselmann collection in more than 170 exhibition projects.
